

Charter schools under IDEA

- Secondary Education Act of 1965 of "charter school" in the Elementary and Charter school, as used in IDEA, has the meaning
- Three options under Part B regulations: 1) charter schools can be public schools of the
- LEA; charter schools can be LEAs themselves; or
- that are neither LEAs nor schools of an LEA charter schools can be nonprofit entities

Rights of children with disabilities in charter schools under IDEA

Students with disabilities attending charter protections under Part B of IDEA that they schools and their parents retain all rights and would have if attending other public schools.

Child with a Disability under IDEA

A child with a disability is a child evaluated in accordance with the IDEA evaluation procedures as having one or more specified needs special education and related services. disabilities and who, because of disability,

Free Appropriate Public education (FAPE) under IDEA

- services that: FAPE includes special education and related
- are provided at public expense, under public supervision and direction, and without charge;
- meet the standards of the SEA, including IDEA Part B requirements;
- include an appropriate preschool, elementary school, or secondary school education in the State involved; and
- are provided in conformity with an IEP.

FAPE under IDEA

FAPE under IDEA

Least restrictive environment under IDEA

- States must ensure that charter school LEAs their responsibilities under Part B of IDEA, including the LRE requirements. and LEAs that include charter schools meet all
- The LRE provisions require that, to the students. charter schools be educated with nondisabled students with disabilities attending public maximum extent appropriate to their needs,

Placement under IDEA
